March Updates

We've been up to a lot at the center this past month! In March we:

- Held a garden meeting at the HCRJC garden and with help from John F. got the boxes ready for planting.
- Hosted a community conversation about forgiveness that was attended by community members, program participants, and staff.
- Played games, snacked, and built community at our 8th game night.
- Facilitated 11 ongoing Rep Panels, 3 community support circles, and 3 CoSAs.

Hartford Support Systems

We work regularly with individuals who need access to different community supports to get their needs met. Rep Panel and CoSA volunteers have expressed that having a better understanding of the resources available to our program participants would be helpful. Here is a short breakdown of some (not all) of the resources available to the folks we work with.

Health Services

Good Neighbor Health Clinic: Provides free health care to individuals who are uninsured or on Medicaid.

Clara Martin: Provides mental health programming, substance use programs, and 24hr emergency support.

HCRS: Provides mental health programming and substance use programs with sliding scale fees





Housing

Twin Pines: Provides subsidized, long-term housing across the Upper Valley.

The Haven: Provides short term shelters as well as as housing caseworkers to help individuals find vouchers.

Food

United Methodist Church: This White River Junction church has a 24/7 food pantry by the front door.

The Haven: The temporary location of the Haven food pantry is just up the road from the justice center! individuals can get a box of food or individual meals.
